Tenaska Strives to be a Good Business Neighbor

Tenaska strives to be a good and responsible neighbor in communities where it does business. The company cultivates long-term, mutually beneficial relationships with local leaders and residents built on respect, value and trust. Those bonds are formed during the planning and development process for its generating facilities and continue throughout the life of the plants. Tenaska depends on those good working relationships and open dialogue with local leaders to help maximize the benefits to the community while also ensuring its plants remain competitive businesses and stable employers.

As part of its commitment to being a good neighbor, Tenaska provides significant economic benefits and contributes to community-building programs where it does business. Highlights across our fleet include:

- Approximately \$14.4 million in tax revenue paid for 2021 to local government and schools;
- Approximately 147 well-paying, full-time operations jobs at plant locations in seven states;
- History of working with contractors to hire locally for construction jobs and in selecting local vendors, when possible;
- A long-standing record of support for broad-based community programs, from the local Scouts to food pantries and the United Way;
- Approximately \$901,000 in scholarships provided to more than 900 college-bound seniors to date; and
- Thousands of hours of time donated annually by employees to community projects, from serving on school boards and Chambers of Commerce to tutoring students and coaching athletics.

The Berkshire power plant in Massachusetts and other Tenaska-operated facilities provide educational tours for local leaders, schools groups and community organizations.

Tenaska is committed to hiring locally for construction and operations jobs and in selecting local vendors, when possible. At the Tenaska Imperial Solar Energy Center South near Calexico, California, 70 percent of construction workers came from communities in Imperial County.

"When Tenaska arrived in our county it seemed they were too good to be true. Ten years later, we are a living testament that when they become a part of a community, they follow through on all the things they say they will do, and then go above and beyond what a normal industry would do. Many companies will make monetary contributions to schools; however, there are few that will allow time for their employees to get one-on-one with students by working daily in a tutoring program. Tenaska has been funding at least two scholarships each year. Many of our graduates are unable to attend colleges or universities because of the high cost of post-secondary education. These scholarships have provided a portion of the funding to help students reach their dreams."
